

France triumphs at the Decanter World Wine Awards 2021

When it comes to top medals once again France leads the way with 15 Best in Show medals, 38 Platinums and 122 Golds, including competition-firsts for wines from the Savoie and Jura

7 JULY, LONDON: After two weeks of rigorous, and for the second year-running COVID-safe, judging in London's Canary Wharf, the results of the Decanter World Wine Awards 2021 are finally here, with French producers picking up more top medals than any other country.

Now in its 18th year, the Decanter World Wine Awards (DWWA) is the world's largest and most influential wine competition. More than 160 judges, including 44 Masters of Wine and 11 Master Sommeliers, judged 18,094 wines from 56 countries at this year's edition, making it a record year for wines tasted.

In total 2021 saw 50 Best in Show, 179 Platinum and 635 Gold medals awarded, making up 0.28%, 0.99% and 3.51% respectively of the total wines tasted.

France claimed 15 Best in Show medals, an impressive 30% of those awarded, and an increase from the 12 won in 2020, as well as 38 Platinum and 122 Gold medals - both categories celebrating year-on-year improvements. The Best in Show medals came from right across the board with strong showings from Bordeaux, Burgundy (3 medals) and Champagne and Rhône (2 medals each).

Notably the Savoie and Jura regions both won their first-ever DWWA Best in Show medals. The Roussanne-based **Domaine Charles Gonnet, Vin de Savoie Chignin-Bergeron 2020** wowed judges scoring 97 points with its 'dancing mountain freshness' and 'tender, apricot-like acidity'.

In the Jura two unique wines impressed; the **Domaine Berthet-Bondet Savagnin, Château-Chalon 2013** won a Best in Show medal and the **Domaine Badoz, Vin Jaune, Côtes du Jura 2014** awarded a Platinum - another first for the region.

There were also Best in Show and Platinum medals across Languedoc-Roussillon, Provence, Southwest France, Loire, Beaujolais and Alsace, demonstrating once again France's strength in depth.

Notable Best in Show wines included the 'deep, youthful' **Albert Bichot, Domaine du Clos Frantin Les Malconsorts, Vosne-Romanée 1er Cru 2019** from Burgundy, which thrilled every judge who tried it, and the **Charles Heidsieck, Rosé Réserve Brut NV**, a great gastronomic rosé wine with 'cavalier autumn fruits' and 'breadth and audacity of flavour'.

France's highest scoring wines all hailed from Champagne, with three Vintage Champagnes, **Champagne Legras & Haas, L.T.S. Blanc de Blancs Grand Cru 2008**, **Palmer & Co, Brut 2012** and **Piper-Heidsieck, Brut 2014**, scoring 98 points - just 14 wines in the entire competition received this top score.

On judging Champagne across seven days of the competition, Regional Chair Simon Field MW said: "I was excited by the overall quality and also by the diversity on offer; we were treated to some superb wines from the magnificent 2012 vintage, just limbering up, and also from 2008, already recognized as a classic. There were also fascinating and rather unusual wines, not only from unsung regions such as the Cote des Bar, but also from the almost forgotten varietals, Pinot Blanc and Arbanne amongst them.

Most of the wines, of course, were from the Non Vintage category and their quality was also impressive. One of the reasons for this was that many producers now use the superb 2018 vintage for their base wines. Conversely, however, and somewhat paradoxically, the difficult economic conditions of the last two years have also meant, logically, that some of these wines are getting a little more lees ageing, in itself generally no bad thing. A terrific experience all in all."

Andrew Jefford, DWWA Co-Chair, said, "DWWA is the world's leading wine competition. I'm absolutely thrilled to take part in it every year because having tasted in a number of other competitions I know how well it's organised, how carefully everything is done. So if you get a medal from DWWA it really is worth having and everybody respects it internationally. We get entries from every corner of the wine world, so it is as it were the closest you can get to a universal benchmark."
